



Progress Toward 10-Year Plan Goal: Supportive Housing Buildings

Parkview Terrace (March 2008)

- Direct Access to Housing building (for seniors 55+) opened March 2008
- 20 units for chronically homeless with supportive services on site
- 80 affordable units

Allen Hotel (December 2008)

- Human Services Agency Housing First Master Lease building.
- 64 Units will serve HOT clients who have a long history of homelessness.



Progress Toward 10-Year Plan Goal: New Supportive Housing Opening in 2009

990 Polk (Winter 2008/09)

- First housing in the State to use Prop 63 funds for mental health services
- 50 units for chronically homeless with supportive services on site 60 affordable apartments

Mosaica (early 2009)

- 31 supportive units for seniors and families
- Integrated into 138 unit development with rental and ownership housing in the Mission

Arnett Watson (early 2009)

- 83 supportive units for families & individuals
- Direct referrals from HSA

10th and Mission Family Housing (Late 2009)

- 44 supportive housing units for homeless families
- 92 affordable apartments

Increased Support for Homeless Women



HSA is developing a new supportive housing building for women.

This is a 65 unit building of supportive units for women only.

250 new units in pipeline

- Parkview Terrace (Western Addition)—opened 2008
- 990 Polk Street—opening winter 2008/2009
- Mosaica (Mission District)—opening 2009
- 9th and Jessie (SOMA)—opening 2010
- Institute on Aging/Geary Senior Housing—opening 2010
- Arendt House—opening 2010

131 new affordable homes by end of 2009

opening late 2009


Increased Support for Homeless Families


Implemented \$2.3 million short-term rental subsidy up to \$500/month to enable families to exit or avoid the homeless shelter system, obtain employment, and ultimately pay rent on their own.

214 families are receiving a subsidy.

76 others have successfully exited the program and remain housed.

Giving change is not making change.



Quality of Life Citations


Primary Citations Locations*

Providing new point of coordination between criminal justice and social services to help those most in need


- CJC advisory board appointed September 2008; Coordinator hired October 2008






Keeping Families Together

Transitional Housing for Foster Youth









Affordable Housing Production


Affordable Homes Completed by Type

San Francisco Housing Authority Repairs

- Over 428 vacant apartments repaired and leased to families on the Housing Authority waiting list since January 2008.
- Occupancy rate has increased to 95.6% in 9 months.
- \$4 million in City funds to assist SFHA in FY 07-08 and 08-09.

Closing the Digital Divide

- **Over 2,000 low income housing units have free**
- **Wi-Fi**
- **More than 2,500 units will be online by the end of 2008**
- **Coordinating and providing free computer training and support at San Francisco Housing Authority sites**
- **Created computer refurbishment program - local businesses, non profits and the City have donated 1,081 computers**

Who uses the Working Families Tax Credit?

- San Francisco's local EITC.
- 12,000 working families in San Francisco will use the credit in 2008.
- 50% have at least a high school education.



Bank on San Francisco


- **24,714 accounts**
 - Original goal - 10,000 accounts by end of 2008
 - Current goal – Exceeded goal of 20,000 new accounts
- **Average monthly balance - \$980**
- **80% of accounts in good standing**
- **Bank on California launches in December - First statewide effort**
- **Bank on Cities**
 - 60 cities in 33 states
- **Five national organizations have adopted program (National League of Cities, William J. Clinton Foundation, US Department of the Treasury, US Conference of Mayors, AARP)**
